

Victorian graves, city views



Undercliffe Cemetery: High on the hill and overlooking the city, the cemetery is well known for its ornate Victorian graves and monuments.

It opened in 1854 during the height of Bradford's industrial power when the city's population had increased nearly tenfold. The site continues to be a working burial ground and is thought to contain 23,000 graves.

History fans will appreciate the themed information boards dotted around the site. Our route passes several of them but there are lots of options to take alternative paths and read all 20. This walk is in partnership with volunteers from Undercliffe Cemetery Charity who manage and care for the grounds.



Bradford on Foot

Bradford on Foot is a rich collection of walks around the 2025 UK City of Culture. Discover new places to visit and new groups to join. The walks have been selected by local people and partners from across the district. Access the maps online or pick up the free paper maps at different locations across the district, including your local library.





Look out for

Alfred Illingworth's Mausoleum: It's easy to spot this imposing Egyptian inspired monument from the early 1900's. Alfred Illingworth was the wealthy owner of Whetley Mills: one of the largest spinning mills in Bradford. His grave was commissioned at a time when Britain occupied Egypt. The tomb, guarded by two Sphinxes, is incongruous now but would have been at the height of fashion then.

William Mawson's Obelisk: This monument is another Egyptian design, inset at the base with a striking blue portrait of the architect William Mawson. One of Bradford's most famous architects from the 1800's, William Mawson found great success in his partnership with Francis Lockwood. Several of Bradford's most celebrated landmarks including St George's Hall, The Wool Exchange, Bradford City Hall and the layout of Saltaire Village (now a World Heritage Site), were designed by Lockwood and Mawson.



Undercliffe Cemetery

- (1) Start at the lodge on Undercliffe Lane and head along the entrance pathway, passing the introductory information board on your left. Look out for The Cross of Sacrifice, visible along a cobbled pathway to the right.
- (2) At the end of the entrance pathway, you reach a junction with the boulevard and an open space on each side where the chapels used to be, one on the consecrated side of the cemetery to your
- (3) Continue along the boulevard, then take a left turn into the pathway that sweeps down to the next level. As you walk, you will see an information board entitled 'Creatives Making a Splash' to the right of the path.
- (4) Take the next left heading upwards, passing by the new burials section. Please be mindful that Undercliffe is a working cemetery and funerals regularly take place here. As the path levels out the Historic Core will be to your left. Look out for the iconic Illingworth tomb, guarded by two sphinxes.
- Continue as the path sweeps up towards the Boulevard. Look out for the 'Sassy Lasses' information board, celebrating women who have helped to shape Bradford, including Christine Chapple who was pivotal in saving Undercliffe Cemetery from dereliction back in the 1980s.
- (5) Turn right onto the Boulevard and look out for the many different styles of monument, including Celtic crosses. On your right you will see the 'Architects' information board by William Mawson's monument which is adorned by a distinctive bronze plaque.
- (8) Turn right between the chapel lawns and head back towards the lodge where your walk began.
